Pastor's Message

February 2012

Participating in the Vital Congregation Process: Learning New Ways to Be in Ministry <u>With</u> the Community

I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. (Jeremiah 29:11).

You church has already begun to kick off a goals-setting process to engage the community in ministry in exciting ways. Already folks have begun to return some of the questionnaires to help our Vital Congregation Planning Team clarify our strategic context. That strategic context will be further fleshed out in focus groups that will be convened on February 19 between worship services.

The process will pay attention to these three areas successively over the next three months:

- 1) *Context* Who are we and what are the strategic challenges that we face, based on our place in time, location in our community, and qualities as a congregation?
- 2) *Content* What resources and strategies do we have to meet the challenges we see in our context?
- 3) *Conduct* What actions and changes in behavior need to take place to meet the challenges and positively impact our context (not just our congregation but our community as well)?

Our evaluation of the context of our ministry, the content of our ministry and the conduct of our ministry will enable our Planning Team to develop SMART goals (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, and Time-framed).

What does a SMART goal look like? Let's say that we want to add a new worship service that is more spiritual and experiential in nature to attract younger worshippers in search of a more contemplative, reflective worship experience. The goal could be phrased as follows: "Develop a new contemplative, experiential worship service by September 2012 that attracts younger worshippers in search of a deep worship experience so that we encourage the development of member spirituality and increase worship attendance by 12-15 members by September 2014." The goal is specific (new contemplative, experiential worship service), it's measurable (develop member spirituality and increase worship attendance by 12-15 persons), it's attainable in that it does not place an unreasonable expectation on the church, it's relevant (speaking to a younger population in ways that are relevant to their context), and it's time-framed (the service will be developed by September 2012 and the attendance will have increased by 12-15 congregants two years later).

Our church has a very relevant message to deliver to our community and the world. The problem is that we have not always engaged the community and the world in a meaningful way. Jesus did not just teach in the synagogue. He met with the people where they were—in their houses and on the hillsides—ministering not just to the people but with them. Let's engage our community as Jesus has taught us.

Shrove Tuesday is the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday which is the first day of Lent. It's a day of penitence, to clean the soul, and a day of celebration as the last chance to feast before Lent begins. Lent is a Tuesday is the last chance to indulge yourself. In the old days there were many foods that observant Christians would not eat during Lent: such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods. The need to eat up the fats gave rise to the French name Mardi Gras; meaning Fat Tuesday. Pancakes became associated with Shrove Tuesday as they were a dish that could use up all the eggs, fats and milk in the house with just the addition of flour.
